




## Nearly 3 in 4 Muslims state their only National Identity as British





- Other Identity and at least one UK Identity
- Other Identity Only
- Irish Identity
- British Only Identity (And/or at least one UK Identity)

## What does this mean?

- An overwhelming majority, 73%, of the Muslim population in England and Wales consider British to be their only national identity, despite more than half (52.8%) of them born abroad.
- This 2011 Census finding is consistent with other academic studies and research. A YouGov poll (2014) found that 63% of British Muslims strongly agreed, or tended to agree, with the statement 'I am proud to be a British citizen and to be identified as part of this nation'. A University of Essex study (2013) found that Muslims identify with Britishness more than any other group of Britons up to 83% were 'proud' to be a British citizen, compared to 79% of the general public; 77% strongly identify with Britain compared to 50% of the rest.
- Although the overwhelming majority of Muslims see their foremost national identity as 'British', further research is needed to understand what this really *means* for different Muslims. Research by Ali (2013) found that 'Britishness' and 'Belonging to Britain' had two key meanings for British Muslims: 1) a 'cultural' feeling (at ease) and 2) an 'affective' feeling (feel attached). British Muslims interpreted the question of belonging to Britain in different ways.
